

INTERCULTURAL LEADERSHIP SUMMER COURSE





An English-intensive leadership programme for students from China and New Zealand

A unique opportunity for Chinese undergraduate students who have a strong interest in leadership and at least an intermediate knowledge of English to engage with different international leadership topics. This year's programme builds on the highly successful innaugural 2013 programme.

O UR WORLD IS A CHANGING PLACE – a place where information and communication know no borders, and where local events have global consequences. The welfare and security of humanity depends upon responsible action, both individual and communal. This dynamic environment requires us to be equipped with the knowledge, skills and awareness to address the challenges of tomorrow.

The Intercultural Leadership Summer Course (ILSC) – an English-intensive programme for students from China and New Zealand – addresses these challenges by enhancing student understanding of leadership in the context of global citizenship.

The four-week programme will cover themes related to international leadership, cross-cultural communication and understanding, the environment and sustainability, regional challenges and global connectedness.

Through the ILSC, participants will be exposed to New Zealand culture and connect with Victoria University students through various activities. The programme encourages students from both countries to reflect on the respective places of their societies in the rapidly changing Asia-Pacific region. The programme aims to develop students' intercultural and cross-cultural competence.

The ILSC will establish a framework for thinking about global leadership challenges through seminars, reflective journaling, hands-on workshops and social activities. Participants will be encouraged to approach global and regional issues from different angles, including reading background materials provided by seminar facilitators, discussing topics in groups, debating current issues and applying the key concepts to written reflections and a group project.

This year's programme will include several field trips in the Greater Wellington region, a weekend study trip to Rotorua and a model APEC forum.

Students will receive a course outline before their arrival in Wellington. Upon completion of the programme, students will receive a grade and be awarded a certificate of participation from Victoria University.







SELECTION CRITERIA

Students invited to participate in the ILSC will be selected by their home institution as well as Victoria University, based on the following criteria:

- + overall academic merit;
- + intermediate knowledge of English (minimum score equivalent to IELTS 5.5 / TOEFL 525); and
- + demonstration of interest in global leadership challenges (assessed through an essay).

DATES & COSTS

The four-week programme will run from Tuesday 14 January to Saturday 8 February 2014. We recommend arriving in Wellington during the afternoon on Monday 13 January. The check-out date will be on Saturday 8 February.

A maximum of 30 student places are available.

The costs of the four-week programme for 2014 are outlined below, in New Zealand dollars:

*Includes medical and travel insurance (Studentsafe package), airport transfers, programme materials, English language component, leadership component, local sightseeing and activities.

**Note that these costs are current at the time of issue of this agreement, but that any increases beyond the control of the University will be passed on directly to students.

Note that the above costs do NOT include:

- + international airfare to and from Wellington, and travel visa costs;
- public transport in and around Wellington approximately \$25 per week;
- + entertainment approximately \$40 per week;
- personal spending (snacks, toiletries, international phone calls, etc) – approximately \$30 per week.

A highlight of the ILSC is a weekend study trip to Rotorua. Experience a slice of New Zealand life: visit a working farm, take part in a Māori cultural experience, soak in thermal hot pools and enjoy some exciting adrenalin activities.

 Contemporary China Research Centre, a
 Confucius Institute (partnered with Xiamen
 University), and the Centre for Strategic Studies;
- reciprocal China New Zealand Field Study for undergraduate students with the Chinese University of Political Science and Law in the area of Political Science and International Relations;
- + Exchange partners with leading Chinese universities;
- + other forms of scholarly, diplomatic and developmental engagement.

The proposed intercultural programme for promising young Chinese and New Zealand leaders is a key part of Victoria's strategy of partnershipbuilding with one of our key Asian neighbours. It is based on the premise that long-term mutual understanding must involve greater interaction between young people from both countries.
